#### **AUDIT OVERVIEW**

This report provides an overview of Asian Captive Elephant Standards on-site audit.

Asian Captive Elephant Standards is a Thai company created in 2019 to provide a professional independant and transparent expertise to the elephant welfare and human well being conditions in touristic elephant camps in South East Asia.

The standards consist of 225 criteria designed by Asian Captive Elephant Standards and advisors including world renowned veterinarians, zookeepers and researchers.

This new version of the standards was updated in January 2023 to include new criteria and practices.

# Asian Captive Elephant Standards is the only international certification focusing on Asian captive elephants.

# Camp's description:

The Golden Triangle Asian Elephant Foundation (GTAEF) in northern Thailand offers a natural environment for elephants, with about 65,000 square meters per elephant. A full-time veterinarian with over seven years of experience ensures regular health checks and comprehensive medical care. Activities like "Walking with Giants" focus on education and responsible interaction.

GTAEF prioritizes sustainability with energy-saving protocols, solar panels, and effective waste management. The camp is clean and minimizes plastic waste with refillable bottles. It supports local communities by hiring locally, purchasing food from nearby farmers, and offering educational programs for schools.

# 1. Legal Requirements

The facility provided all legal documents such as company license and elephant identification books.

#### 2. Facility Management

The facility has successfully met all the mandatory criteria in the Facility Management category, demonstrating a strong commitment to both elephant and staff welfare. However, there is room for improvement in the advanced criteria, particularly in areas related to mahout benefits and specific training documentation.

# 3. Elephant Management

The facility meets high standards in elephant management. Comprehensive policies and detailed individual profiles are maintained. Elephants have ample space, natural substrates, and alternatives to chains. Enrichment programs are robust, providing supervised roaming and socialization. The facility actively supports the well-being of compatible elephants, ensuring their health and comfort. Overall, the facility excels in both mandatory and advanced criteria.

# 4. Elephant welfare

The facility demonstrates a high standard of elephant welfare, excelling in medical care, dietary management, and overall well-being of the elephants. They maintain comprehensive veterinary logs, employ an experienced full-time veterinarian, and follow rigorous health check routines. The facility provides specialized care for geriatric elephants and ensures extensive foraging options and socialization opportunities. Only a few criteria were not met, such as specific veterinarian training (4.4) and certain health checks for new elephants (4.27).

# 5. Elephant activities

The facility excels in managing elephant activities by prioritizing natural behaviors and safety. There are robust protocols ensuring no harmful practices, and a notable balance between interaction and observation activities. The feeding protocol stands out as a best practice, emphasizing a nutritious diet. While documentation and adherence to training protocols need improvement, the overall management aligns with high welfare standards. The facility's emphasis on observation over interaction further highlights its commitment to elephant welfare.

## 6. Visitor safety

This category focuses on ensuring visitor and staff safety during interactions with elephants. Most criteria are validated, showcasing strong protocols, insurance, supervision, and safety measures. However, some mandatory criteria, such as evacuation drills and specific first aid training, were not validated due to insufficient evidence. The facility is encouraged to address these gaps to improve overall safety and compliance.

# 7. Visitor experience

The facility excels in enhancing visitor experience by providing comprehensive educational information about elephants, including detailed guide explanations on elephant behavior, history, and welfare. Visitors benefit from shaded areas, accessible drinking water, and proper sanitation facilities. The camp demonstrates a strong commitment to environmental sustainability by offering refillable glass bottles and drink dispensers, significantly reducing plastic use. However, the facility needs to improve its feedback analysis system and increase efforts in providing wheelchair-accessible toilets within the camp.


## 8. Overall camp

The facility demonstrates strong environmental and operational standards in Category 8. They have effective energy-saving and waste management protocols, maintaining cleanliness and waste segregation with regular riverbank cleaning. The camp effectively reuses elephant dung and ensures waste bins are inaccessible to elephants. Essential vehicle traffic is limited in the elephant area, and parking is suitably distanced to minimize noise. While the facility uses some solar energy, it did not meet the 10% threshold. Overall, their commitment to sustainability and cleanliness is commendable, enhancing the camp's operational excellence.

# 9. Community relations

The facility demonstrates strong community relations by supporting local economies through the purchase of elephant food, and providing educational opportunities for local schools. Additionally, they offer a dedicated area for local handicrafts, ensuring that 100% of the revenue goes back to the local communities. Their collaboration with third-party conservation initiatives, such as the Golden Triangle Asian Elephant Foundation, further highlights their commitment to elephant protection and conservation.







# **FINAL DECISION**

The camp Golden Triangle Anantara Elephant Foundation managed to comply with all the Mandatory criteria and 71% of the Advanced criteria.

SILVER level
